Assignments

We will have several assignments throughout the semester. Some will be homework problems, while others will require data analysis. Attendance

Article summaries and discussion

You will be required to write a short 3-5 page summary of 4 different articles during the course of the semester. The assignment will be given one week before it is due. You will also be expected to present and discuss that particular article in class on the date that the written summary is due. You will be graded on both the written paper and your classroom discussion.

Exams

All exams will consist of short-answer essay questions and problems. The final exam is NOT cumulative. However, the last exam will be given during the final exam time. If you miss the midterm and provide me with a legitimate (and properly documented) excuse **BEFORE** the exam, you will have the option of increasing the weight of your remaining exam, or taking a make-up exam (which must be taken before or during the next class period following the exam). If you miss the midterm and do not provide me with a legitimate excuse beforehand, you will receive a grade of zero for that exam.
